DUI Crackdown Results In 685 Arrests

BY KIMBERLEY SANDER

Los Angeles County – Summer time provides much cause for celebration. From the excitement of being out of school and family vacations to the 4th of July and Labor Day holidays, summer can also be one of the deadliest times of year because of too much "celebrating".

The CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) states that 30 people die every day in

motor vehicle accidents involving alcohol-impaired drivers, and that's just in the United States.

This past Independence Day weekend, law enforcement banded together to remove dangerous drivers from the highways before lives were lost. From 12:01 a.m. on Thurs., July 4 through midnight on Sun., July 7, Anti-DUI deployments and routine traffic stops helped to make our communities safer.

According to a LA County

Sheriff news release, officers representing 100 county law enforcement agencies arrested 685 individuals driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol. This is up nearly 27% from last year.

The report also stated that more Anti-DUI deployments will be in effect in Los Angeles County during the 18-day

Lanes Will Close On 60 Freeway

STAFF REPORTS

Rowland Heights - Three lanes of the 60 freeway will be closed in July and August starting this weekend.

Caltrans have recently issued a press release stating that the Pomona freeway (SR-60) will be closed periodically for pavement rehabilitation work between Fullerton Rd. and Nogales St. The "55 Hour Weekend Lane Closure" as Caltrans are calling it, states that on the weekends of July 12, July 26, August 9, and August 23, up to three lanes will be closed for maintenance.

The roads will be under construction due to the heavy weight of cars and trucks over time, requiring a more than two feet deep replacement of pavement and concrete base. Caltrans say the new surface will provide a smooth, safer drive for motorists, reduce time required for maintenance and minimize the need for further lane closures. Work is expected to be complete in late 2014.

ends, Caltrans will replace the No. 3 and No. 4 lanes of the westbound SR-60 freeway between the Fullerton Rd. and Nogales St. exits. Additional closures for the weekend:

From Fri., July 12 at 10 p.m. to Mon., July 15 at 5 a.m., three lanes of the westbound SR-60 will be closed; northbound SR-57 to westbound SR-60 connector will be closed; and the following onramps: Brea Canyon Rd., Fairway Dr., Nogales St., and Fullerton Rd. will also be closed. At midnight on Friday, only the car-pool lane will be open to all vehicles. Some lanes will reopen at 10 p.m. on Saturday and all lanes will reopen at 5 a.m. on Monday.

From Fri., July 26 at 10 am to Mon., July 29 at 5 a.m., two lanes of the westbound SR-60 will be closed and the northbound SR-57 to westbound SR-60 connector road will be closed. The same on-ramps will be also closed: Brea Canyon Rd., Fairway Dr., Nogales St., and Fullerton Rd. From midnight on Friday until 5 a.m. on Saturday, all westbound

lanes will be closed. Some lanes will reopen on Saturday, but all lanes will be closed again at midnight on Sunday until Monday at 5 a.m.

During the following weekends, Caltrans will replace the No. 3 and No. 4 eastbound SR-60 lanes between the same two exits. Closures for these weekends include:

From Fri., Aug. 9 at 10 p.m. to Mon., Aug. 12 at 5 a.m., three lanes of the eastbound 60 will be closed and the following onramps will be closed: Hacienda Blvd., Azusa Ave., Fullerton Rd., and south Nogales St. The following off-ramps will also be closed: Fullerton Rd. and Nogales St.

From Fri., Aug. 23 at 10 p.m.

to Mon., Aug. 26 at 5 a.m., the same on-ramps will be closed: Hacienda Boulevard, Azusa Ave., Fullerton Rd., and south Nogales St. and the same off-ramps will also be closed: Fullerton Rd. and Nogales St. However, the SR-57 and SR-60 connector will remain open.


Caltrans recommend planning a different route using their map app at quickmap.dot.ca.gov/. If you know you will be traveling on the 60 freeway during the construction, Caltrans encourage you to bring water, snacks, medications, and entertainment for children because the delay is expected to be long.







Crime Recap

SGV - This week's crime involves a broken water main, a crash in Hacienda Heights that knocked down power lines, a Community Club Treasurer that pleaded no contest, a man convicted of torching a church, as well as several other crashes in the Walnut-Diamond Bar area.

On July 3, an aircraft component manufacturing company was badly damaged by a broken water main. At around 6 a.m., the water main burst and flooded into the large concrete building causing it's employees to evacuate. Once firefighters made it inside, they made sure to get all com-

puters and private documents to safety to protect any crucial business information from being destroyed in the flood.

On July 4, a pickup truck crashed into a power pole on Gale Ave. knocking live wires onto the roadway. However, the crash did not knock out power in the area.

Two accidents occured on July 5. The first accident occured on the 60 freeway where a big rig hit the center divider causing it to go over the side and spill its contents all over the lanes on the westbound 60 freeway. The cause of the accident has not been immediately released yet. The second accident lead to

the death of a Walnut man who was a passenger in a SUV that veered off the road onto the pavement, then dirt and subsequently overturned. The man was identified as Pinagpala Ojastro, 68, who was pronounced dead at the Inland Valley Regional Medical Center in Wildomar.

On July 7, another car crash was reported on Valley Blvd in City of Industry. One person was injured in the crash, but their name and status have not yet been released.

On July 9, Gregory Yusuke Shiga, 35, was convicted of torching St. John Vianney Catholic Church in Hacienda Heights. Shiga caused an estimated 9 million dollars in damage when he set the church ablaze just after midnight on April 16. Shiga will return before the judge on July 19 and is facing life in prison.

On the night of April 16, Shiga broke into the church's sanctuary where he saturated rolls of toilet paper with a flammable material and also used a device to cover the structures walls and ceilings in an accelerant. Shiga was finally arrested after a yearlong investigation by police and the FBI.

On July 10, a former Community Club treasurer that was charged with grand theft and forgery has pleaded no contest to her charges and will return to court Oct 23 for sentencing.

Lisa May also known as Lisa Haygood, 55, was previously a volunteer as Castle Rock's Community Club treasurer. An investigation had determined that May took \$39,651 from the Community Club's fund by forqing checks numerous times. The release stated that the theft occurred over a 6 year period and was discovered in June of 2011. Detectives sifted through a paper trail of bank records, checks and receipts which culminated in the case being presented to the D.A. for filing consideration.

Detectives from Walnut/Diamond Bar Station filed a felony complaint with the District Attorney charging May with six felony counts of Grand Theft and Forgery. A felony warrant was issued for May's arrest and she was taken into custody on March 5, 2013.

allergic reaction, without facing civil liability for trying to save a life.

"Current law does not give people the tools to save the life of someone dying from an allergic reaction," said Senator Huff. "This was once a problem for school nurses, who could do nothing for students suffocating from a severe allergic reaction because the student had not been prescribed medication. Recent legislation has corrected this problem. But further correction is needed. What happens to those kids who aren't on school grounds?"

EpiPens, though intended for use by lay consumers, require a prescription. Presently, epinephrine auto-injectors can only be used by the person for whom it is prescribed on him or herself. If given by anyone else, outside of a physician's direction, it is illegal, and subjects even a Good Samaritan rescuer to civil and criminal liability exposure.

According to recent medical studies, anaphylaxis allergic reactions are responsible for 1,500 deaths a year in the United States. It's estimated that six million children in the United States suffer from allergies. Anaphylaxis is a pervasive lethal threat, both to those with known allergies and those who suddenly become sensitized to a substance – be it a simple bee sting, ingestion of shell fish or coming in contact with peanuts.

"The purpose of SB 669 is to increase the chances that if a person suffers a life-threatening allergic reaction, there will be someone close by with medication to save their life," said Senator Huff.

SB 669 has earned the support of Food Allergy Research & Education (FARE), the nation's leading organization advocating for people with food allergies and their families, in addition to the California Medical Association.





acts on a child under 14 with a sentencing enhancement for sex crimes against multiple victims. He was previously charged for Jane Doe #1 with three felony counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child and three felony counts of forcible lewd acts on a child under 14. Anast is also charged with one felony count of possession and control of child pornography.

If convicted on all counts, he now faces a maximum sentence of 78 years to life in state prison and mandatory lifetime sex offender registration. The defendant is being held on \$1 million bail.

Between Nov. 2, 1997, and Nov. 1, 2000, Anast is accused of sexually assaulting his female relative, Jane Doe #1, by forcibly digitally penetrating the victim on at least four different occasions in three different locations including Garden Grove and Stanton. The victim was 11 years old in 1997.

In May 2013, Jane Doe #1 contacted the Orange County Sheriff's Department to report

the sexual assaults. Anast was arrested at Disneyland, where he worked as a machinist fixing rides. In his home, Anast is accused of possessing several videos of child pornography on a computer data storage device, including several possiblyamateur images of young girls. Anast was charged with the sex crimes against Jane Doe #1 and for possession of child pornography on June 24, 2013.

The ongoing investigation resulted in the identification of Jane Doe #2. Between 1996 and 2000, Anast is accused of sexually assaulting the daughter of a family friend, Jane Doe #2, beginning when she was 7 years old. The defendant is accused of molesting the victim on at least two occasions by rubbing her vaginal area at his home in Orange County and her home in Los Angeles County. The Orange County District Attorney's Office is prosecuting Anast for the crimes that occurred in both Orange and Los Angeles Counties.

The investigation is ongoing to identify the children depicted in images found in the defendant's computer. Anyone with additional information or who believes they have been a victim is encouraged to contact Supervising District Attorney Investigator Paul Carvo at (714) 347-8794.

Anast's mandatory lifetime sex offender registration will bar him from entering County recreational areas and City parks which have passed the Sex Offender Ordinance. Visit www.orangecountyda.com to read the prior press releases on the County's Sex Offender Ordinance as well as the 14 other cities that have enacted the Child Safety Zone Ordinance.

Deputy District Attorney Bobby Taghavi of the Sexual Assault Unit is prosecuting this case.

will be cracking down on both those operating regular vehicles and motorcycles who are under the influence of drugs or alcohol, speeding, making illegal turns, or any other dangerous violation.

Motorcycle fatalities saw a phenomenal drop of 37 percent from 2008 to 2010, but rose nearly 18 percent in 2011. Operations like this are aimed at curbing any more rises in motorcycle deaths and sending the numbers back downward.

California collision data reveals that primary causes of motorcycle-involved crashes include speeding, unsafe turning and impairment due to alcohol and other drugs. The Moreno Valley Police Department is also reminding all motorists to always be alert and watch out for motorcycles, especially when turning and changing lanes.

As the economy turns upward, there will likely be more miles driven by all vehicles, plus more novice motorcycle riders who are untrained and unable to handle the power of today's motorcycles. The message to all drivers and motorcyclists is: share in the responsibility and do your part by safely "sharing the road." Riders can get training through the California Motorcyclist Safety Program. 


