Election Season Kicks Off For Walnut

Walnut - Three candidates filed their nomination papers for the Walnut City Council election, set for April 8. The three candidates include current Council Members Mary Su and Bob Pacheco, along with a new candidate, Betty Tang. The election

season kicked off on Saturday, Jan. 11, when incumbents Mary Su and former assemblyman, Bob Pacheco, held their re-election campaign at their Lemon Creek Village shopping campaign headquarters.

A number of elected federal, state and local officials and other dignitaries were in attendance to

support the pair of candidates seeking to retain their seats on the Council. Among those were U.S. Rep. Judy Chu, D-Monterey Park; U.S. Rep. Ed Royce, R-Fullerton; State Assemblyman Curt Hagman; and former U.S.

Trial Date Set for Former Lorbeer Teacher

Diamond Bar - Former Lorbeer Middle School teacher, Steven Andrews, appeared in court this week for a pre-trial hearing. The trial has been delayed several times and will not likely get underway until next month.

Andrews surrendered to Police back in September 2011, admitting he committed lewd acts on a 14-year-old student. Andrews

is facing 17 charges, including six counts of sexual penetration with a foreign object, six counts of unlawful sexual intercourse with a child, two counts of oral copulation with a child under 16, and three counts of lewd acts on a child.

Steven Andrews is set to return to court Jan. 28 for a defense motion. The trial date is tentatively set for Feb. 10, according to the Pomona Superior Court.

Bartlam comes to Chino Hills

from Lodi, California, where he served in the same capacity since 2010. Previously, Bartlam was Lodi's Community Development Director from March 1996 to April 2005, where he is credited with the successful renovation of Lodi's downtown core, according

A Better Place

I went on a Missions trip to Haiti with a team last year, and lately we've been talking about going back. The team and I always talk about how much we miss Haiti, but I think it's strange that we're talking about how much we miss a Third World country, where people lived in poverty and barely had enough food to eat. So the other day, I really thought about what it was that I missed about Haiti and the first thing that popped into my head was: the people.

The Haitian people who lived in the villages were always so friendly to us. They would wave at us as we walked by, have us hold their children, or ask us to pray with them. They were so welcoming everywhere we went. They treated us as we were family, even though we were strangers who didn't even speak their language.

And the Haitian children were a whole new level of welcoming. Whenever we had an opportunity to play with the children, my arm would end of being tired from holding so many of them and my legs would be tired from running around with them the entire day.

At one point, I had a little over ten children surrounding me, each fighting to hold my hand, trying to play with my hair, try on my sunglasses, ask me questions in Creole or do anything to get my attention. The funny part was that as soon as I turned around to look at them, all they would do was give me the biggest smile. The love they showed us was truly remarkable.

It wasn't until we were back in a United States airport that I realized how different Haiti was. The moment I realized we weren't in Haiti anymore was the moment I turned to say "Bonswa" (meaning hello in Creole) to someone, and I didn't see a smiling face like I was used to in Haiti.

It's amazing to think that I miss a country where we didn't have any electricity, where we didn't have clean water, where

we barely had enough food, and where I've sweated more than I've sweated my entire life. But still, I have the urge to go back just so I can see those friendly faces and feel that special love all around me.

The question I found myself asking is, why do I have to go back to feel this way? Why can't I have that same feeling when I'm in my own hometown? Why can't we be friendly to one another here? So I ask you to please help me spread love around the community. Say hi to one another, smile at each other, open doors, help with grocery bags, or do a simple act of kindness to show a stranger this love. As the years progress, I find the world becoming less civil. But who says we can't change it? Let's work together to make this world we live in a better place.

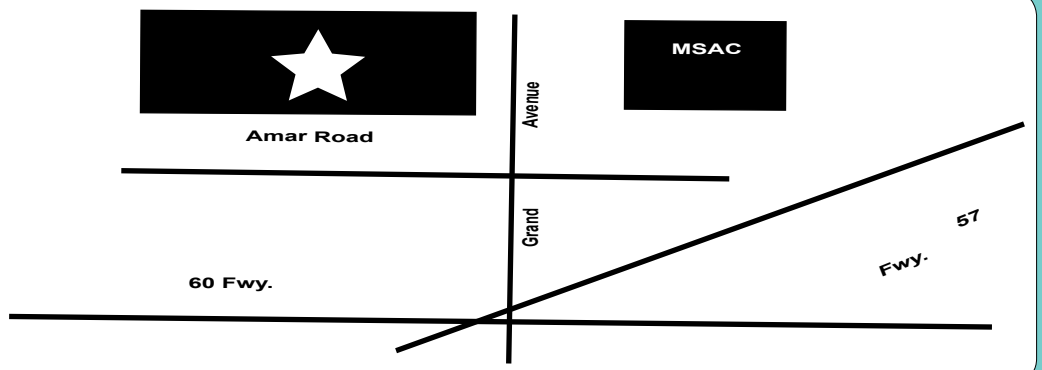

Treasurer, Rosario Marin. Also in attendance were Walnut Mayor, Tony Cartagena; Diamond Bar Mayor, Carol Herrera; Diamond Bar Mayor Pro-Tem, Steve Tye; and a majority of the members of the Walnut Valley School Board, the Walnut Valley Water Board and the Mt. SAC Board of Trustees.

"Mary is really a great person for this community," said Congresswoman Chu. She added that Su's dedication to the City goes back to when she founded the Chinese-American Parents Association for the Walnut Unified School District and continued through her days as President of the city's Chinese-American Association. "This is a person who more than deserves being re-elected to the Walnut City Council. I think we are really lucky to have her."

Marin said she has known Pacheco almost 20 years, and she has supported him at various positions throughout his political career.

"I am here because we want government that works. We yearn for government that really fulfills our needs. We are here for that government that supports our families and keeps them safe, and I am here to support Bob because I know he is an

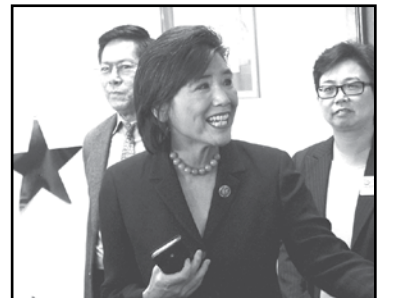

We are in the beginning of a new sermon series at our church in the Old Testament book of Ezra. I have really enjoyed studying and preparing for this series.



The book of Ezra records events in the life of the Jewish people in the 500s BC. Leaders and families from the tribes of

Judah and Benjamin have been living in exile in Babylon (Iran / Iraq) for about 70 years.

After the fall of Babylon, the new Persian King, Cyrus, issued a decree that allowed exiles to return to their homelands. In the British Museum, there is a cylinder (the Cyrus Cylinder), which was discovered in the 1800s, that records this remarkable event.

The decree, which was written in the 500s BC, allowed exiles from many countries to leave Babylon and return to

their homelands.

The book of Ezra provides an account of how the Jewish exiles responded to this unexpected opportunity. Some decided to "go" while others decide to "stay".

How do you think you would respond in their situation? Many of the exiles had built homes and raised families in Babylon. They were not anxious to leave.

Others felt this was a unique opportunity to return to their homeland, even though they

knew that Jerusalem had been destroyed and was mostly uninhabited for the past 50-60 years. They were willing to "go".

How do you respond to unexpected opportunities? Do you play it safe or are you willing to take a chance? Do you prefer the familiar or are you willing to venture into the unknown?

A lot of it has to do with your faith. Are you willing to venture out and trust God to lead and guide you or do you prefer to stay in your comfort zone?

the money from the register. A struggle ensued and the suspect allegedly attempted to stab the store clerk with a

pair of scissors. The suspect left the store with the cash and ran eastbound on Valley Boulevard, according to a news release from Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD).

When Industry Sheriff's deputies arrived on scene, the clerk, who was able to avoid injury, advised them of the direction the suspect headed. Deputies located and attempted to contact the suspect when

he ran into traffic lanes on Valley Boulevard. The lanes were immediately shut down and the suspect was arrested.

Tomas Olivarri, 42, of Baldwin Park, was taken into custody and booked into LASD's

Industry Station for charges of Assault with a Deadly Weapon and Robbery. There are also several unrelated outstanding warrants for Olivarri's arrest, and he is being held in lieu of bail set at \$156,000.

aggravated mayhem, and assault with intent to commit rape during the commission of a burglary, according to the District Attorney's Office.

The incident occurred on Saturday, Oct. 27, 2012, when a 29-year-old woman was awakened in her apartment on the 1500 block of Jellick Avenue in Rowland Heights by an unknown Hispanic male, who then brutally raped and

beat her. The suspect entered the residence at 6 a.m. through an unlocked sliding door and inflicted serious injury upon the victim, according to a Walnut/Diamond Bar Sheriff's Station news release.

Sheriff's deputies and Special Victims Bureau investigators had been searching for a Hispanic male, 30 to 35 years of age in relation to this crime, but recently caught a break when a new suspect was entered into the FBI Combined DNA Index System (CODIS).

The DNA information led detectives to Pablo Reyes Bautista.

According to information from the Walnut/Diamond Bar Sheriff's Station, Major Crimes Bureau detectives located and arrested Bautista, 26, in the Atwater Village area of Los Angeles, after an extensive manhunt. Bautista had previously lived in the Rowland Heights area. He was booked into the Walnut/Diamond Bar Sheriff's Station on charges of Rape by Force, Aggravated Mayhem,

and Burglary. His bail is set at \$1 million, and arraignment was held on Jan. 14, 2014.

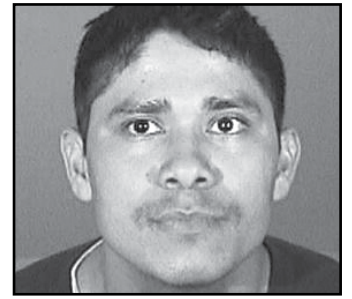

Officers found not guilty

four men took just eight hours to reach a verdict. Prosecutors had argued that footage from a surveillance video proved that Ramos had turned the encounter into a deadly one by using a threat. But, defense attorneys argued that the surveillance video showed that the officers followed department protocol while dealing with an uncooperative and combative suspect.

Another item of contention was the cause of Thomas' death. Thomas, 37, died just five days after the confrontation with the officers. The defense claimed that Thomas died of an enlarged heart caused by years of illegal methamphetamine abuse. Prosecutors claimed that

he died from a lack of oxygen caused by chest compressions and massive facial injuries caused by the defendants.

According to court records, former Fullerton Police Officer Ramos was charged with second-degree murder and involuntary manslaughter.

Former Police Corporal Cicinelli was charged with involuntary manslaughter and excessive force. Both men pled not guilty to all charges. A third officer, former officer Joseph Wolfe, was originally charged with involuntary manslaughter and excessive force. The Orange County District Attorney's Office announced that they will drop the charges

against him.

Now that the state trial has concluded, the FBI will continue with the investigation to ensure that Thomas' civil rights were not violated. Thomas' parents, Ron and Cathy Thomas expressed their shock to the media after the verdict was read and it is likely that a civil suit will continue.

to a Chino Hills press release. Just prior to becoming Lodi City Manager, Bartlam worked in the private sector as a land consultant.

“I look forward to assisting the City Council with good guidance in achieving their goals and carrying out the community’s desires for their City,” said Bartlam in the press release. “I lived in the community in the 1980’s and always enjoyed the environment and feel of the area. The changes of the last 20 years have really created a unique community with the benefits of open spaces and the amenities of city life – it is still a bit of a hidden jewel.”

According to the City, the contract provides for a three-year-term at an annual salary of \$202,800, with a one-time moving and relocation payment of \$10,000. Remaining terms of the contract mirror the previous City Manager’s contract, the press release stated.

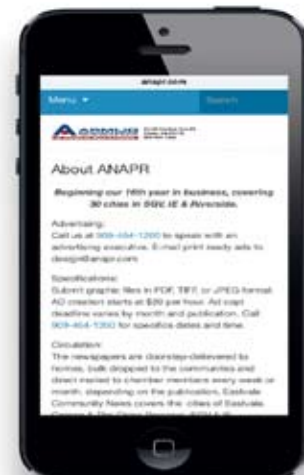
